How can I support my child?

Parent involvement is a critical component of each child's education. Parents are a child's most influential teachers! Involvement may vary according to a child's program. Ongoing teacher-parent communication is vital to all of our programs. Parent Clinics are offered for Grade K through Grade 4 incrementally throughout the year.

Parents find value in attending clinics for these reasons:

- Discuss child's challenging home behaviors and problem solve a solution with the educator team.
- Discuss your child's achievements~ socially, academically and behaviorally within the school and home environments.
- Discuss any upcoming possible home challenges or events (i.e. field trips) that would require school support.
- Leave the clinic with notes taken by a team member for future reference.

Related Services: Related services are provided to those students who require services of: speech and language, occupation therapy, physical therapy, vision/hearing services and orientation and mobility. Therapy can be provided within the classroom, or in a pull-out setting. Teachers work cooperatively with therapists in order to assure continuity of individual programs.

Unique Aspects of the Program

All students will follow a typical buildingbased schedule and be exposed to grade level curricula with scaffolded supports. In addition to their typical schedule, students in program may expect:

- Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA):
 The goals of ABA therapy are to improve language capabilities and other communication skills, limit negative behavioral patterns, improve learning outcomes, and help develop social skills.
- Support from a district Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBA)
- **Discrete Trials**: (if appropriate) A method of teaching in simplified and structured steps. Instead of teaching an entire skill at one time, the skill is broken down and "built-upon" using discrete trials that teach small steps, one at a time.
- Eden Curriculum: Grounded in the principles of Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) and focused upon essential skill areas such as: cognitive, self-care and domestics, speech and language, vocational, physical education, recreation and leisure, employment, and residential living
- Explicit Social Skills Instruction: We Thinkers! helps children build foundational social competencies and essential life skills through stories, lessons, and play activities.

How do we assess student progress?

Data collection in ABA is critical because it is the driving force behind all decisions made in an educational plan. When graphed, it provides a visual that shows overall progress. Based on the data in the graph, the IEP team can determine if progress is being made, or if there is a lack of progress, which indicates that a plan needs to be modified.

- VB-MAPP Assessment (Verbal Behavior Milestones Assessment and Placement Program): A criterion-referenced assessment curriculum guide and skills tracking system designed specifically for children with autism and other individuals who demonstrate language delay.s
- **FBA(Functional Behavior Assessment):** Looks at the reasons behind a child's behavior problems in order to improve behavior.
- Eden Assessment: Identifies a student's strengths and weaknesses, assists with goal selection, tracks progress, and makes it easy to translate the assessment into concrete IEP goals.
